


Enjoy a "paw"fect day out with your pup, meandering down the Arboretum's 16 miles of hiking trails.

# Service Dogs, Emotional Support Dogs, Therapy Dogs: What's the Difference?

Dogs have been aiding and working with humans since ancient times, in everything from farming to hunting to protection and more. Service dogs, emotional support animals, and therapy dogs all fulfill important roles in their aid to humans, but the terms are not interchangeable: each is specifically defined, both in terms of their jobs and their legal rights.

## What Do Service Dogs Do?

As defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), service dogs are individually trained to perform specific tasks and to work with people with disabilities. According to the ADA, disabilities can be "physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability." The work of the service dog must be directly related to the handler's disability. These are just some of the things a service dog can do:

- Guide dogs help blind people navigate in the world.
- Hearing (or signal) dogs alert deaf people to sounds, such as a knock on the door or a person entering the room.
- Psychiatric dogs are trained to detect and lessen the effects of a psychiatric episode.
- Service dogs help those in wheelchairs or who are otherwise physically limited. They may open doors or cabinets, fetch things their handler can't reach, and carry items for their handler.
- Autism assistance dogs are trained to help those on the autism spectrum to distinguish important sensory signals, such as a smoke alarm, from other sensory input. They may also alert their handler to repetitive behaviors or overstimulation.
- Service dogs that are trained to recognize seizures and will stand guard over their handler during a seizure or go for help.



# What Do Emotional Support Animals (ESAs) Do?

Emotional support dogs are not considered service dogs under the ADA. They may be trained for a specific owner, but they are not trained for specific tasks or duties to aid a person with a disability, and this is the main difference between ESAs and service dogs. This doesn't minimize the support these dogs provide for people with a psychological disorder. They're considered companion animals and ease anxiety, depression, some phobias, and loneliness. In order to be considered an emotional support dog, it must be prescribed by a mental health professional for a patient with a diagnosed psychological or emotional disorder, such as anxiety disorder, major depression, or panic attacks.

#### **EMOTIONAL** SUPPORT DOGS

Medically prescribed animals providing therapeutic benefit through dedicated companionship.

# What is a Therapy Dog?

Therapy dogs play a different helping role than service dogs and emotional support animals. They aren't trained to live with a specific handler. Rather, these are dogs that — with their human teammate (often the dog's owner) — volunteer in clinical settings, such as hospitals, mental health institutions,



hospices, schools, and nursing homes, where they provide comfort, affection, and even love in the course of their work. Therapy dogs are trained to be comfortable in new environments and to interact with different people. They should have a calm temperament, be unfazed by unfamiliar noises and movements, be comfortable being handled, and love people.

#### **BLUE-GREEN ALGAE WARNING**

FRIDAY, Aug. 16, 2019 (HealthDay News) -- Your dog bounds heedlessly into a local lake or pond, playfully splashing in the water.

But within minutes, your canine companion is staggering, drooling or suffering seizures. Left untreated, the dog will likely die.

This fate has befallen a handful of pooches exposed to toxic algae blooms this year, experts say.

"Blue-green algae is a bacteria that during certain times of year, certain weather conditions, will produce a toxin that's very harmful to dogs," said Dr. Julie Schildt, an emergency and critical care veterinarian at the University of Tennessee's School of Veterinary Medicine.

Last week, three dogs died within hours of swimming in an algae-polluted local pond in Wilmington, N.C.

All three dogs -- Abby, Izzy and Harpo -- began suffering from seizures within 15 minutes of their evening splash, said the dogs' owner, Melissa Martin.

"We are gutted," Martin said in a Facebook post that has been shared more than 32,000 times. "I wish I could do today over."

Another dog, a border collie named Arya, died following a swim in Georgia's Lake Allatoona last week.

Meanwhile, the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources has reported toxic blue-green algae in a number of lakes, prompting shutdowns of some beaches and recreational areas.

It's hard to say how many canines have fallen ill from toxic algae.

"We don't know how many dogs have died from harmful algal blooms this year," said Michael San Filippo, a spokesman for the American Veterinary Medical Association. "There have been several cases reported in the past month, but these types of deaths aren't reportable, so there's no reliable statistics available."

Blue-green algae usually isn't toxic, Schildt said.

But when the weather is hot and there's been little rain, stagnant water conditions near the shore of ponds and lakes can prompt the algae to start pumping out toxins, Schildt and San Filippo explained.

"They thrive in warm, calm, shallow, nutrient-rich bodies of water," San Filippo said.

Toxic algae can make people sick, too, but it's especially harmful to animals, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said.

There's usually two different scenarios under which animals fall ill following exposure to toxic algae, Schildt said.

"They can develop signs very quickly, within 15 minutes of being in the water or drinking the water," Schildt said. "Those animals can have more neurologic signs -- they might stagger around, they might drool, they might have seizures. It can lead to very quick, rapid death."

Other toxins produced by the algae can cause liver failure, and in that case symptoms might not become apparent until sometime later, Schildt said.

"They could come out of the water and seem relatively OK, then go home and start to show signs like vomiting, diarrhea, abdominal pain, not wanting to eat," Schildt said. Algae poisoning is very difficult for vets to treat, Schildt said.

"Unfortunately, this is a toxin for which there's no specific antidote," Schildt said. "That means we're left just treating symptoms."

The EPA recommends keeping your dog away from slimy water, or water that looks like it has foam or scum on its surface. Also avoid water if it smells bad or if it has an odd color, like blue, bright green, brown or red.

Be sure to keep your dogs on a leash during weather conditions that might promote a toxic algae bloom, San Filippo recommended. That way, they can't run off and jump into a lake before you've had a chance to assess the water's safety.

If you think your dog has gotten into a toxic algae bloom, get the pet out as quickly as possible and rinse the animal off immediately with clean water, Schildt and San Filippo said.

Afterward, keep a close eye out for symptoms like diarrhea, vomiting, weakness, staggering, drooling, difficulty breathing or convulsions. Rush your dog to the vet at the first sign of any of these symptoms.

In fact, it might be worth taking them to the vet preemptively, San Filippo said. "Contact your veterinarian and seek medical help immediately. Intervention before symptoms arise can be lifesaving," San Filippo said.

Unfortunately, climate change might make these sort of algae blooms more likely in coming years, he said.

"Because these blooms thrive in warmer temperatures, you could expect rising temperatures to lead to an increase in harmful algal blooms," San Filippo said.

# Cassic

Wednesday August 21st started out like any other day. My 10 week old golden retriever, Cassie, woke me up at 6:30a.m. She went outside and did her business then ate her breakfast. That afternoon when I returned home Cassie had messed in her crate a lot and when I took her outside she had diarrhea and she refused to eat lunch. As the afternoon progressed she got lethargic and the diarrhea got worse and more often (every 20 mins). I decided to take her to the emergency hospital and while on the way I called ahead and as soon as I walked in Cassie threw up again and went, what I thought was diarrhea, but was straight blood. At that point the technician came right up and scooped her away. Within minutes they came out and took me in a room where I was guarantined because I was told she tested positive for parvovirus. Cassie had been vaccinated with her first set and was within the time frame for the 2nd set of vaccines I had heard the word parvo but never knew what it is or the severity of it. Nothing like being hit with unbelievable information within a short amount of time. While Cassie was in back being treated intravenously with fluids and medications I had to make a decision whether to take her home and hope and pray she makes it through the night or to hospitalize her and hope I win the lottery because, for a 72 hour hospital stay, it would cost \$4,800. I decided to bring her home. While I was quarantined I sent numerous texts messages and emails to inform people because I'm in contact with a lot of dogs and my fear was that I unknowingly passed the virus to someone else's beloved pet (to my knowledge as of today I did not). Fast forward 5 days and daily vets visits to recheck Cassie's labs and received fluids Cassie received her 2 paws up from the vet she was out of the woods. She is to remain isolated from the public except to go potty for a minimum of 2 weeks preferrably 3 weeks. Since I live in a condo, I've informed my neighbors to avoid the area where I'm letting her do her business. I am hopeful that she'll make a full recovery from this awful and deadly virus. As of today (day 7 and counting post diagnosis) Cassie is eating, drinking, and pooping all normal and acting every bit the way a puppy should. I want to thank Cheri and Chuck with GABOC for their outpouring support and concern while I'm going through this. I'd also like to mention that during one of the many vet visits while Cassie and I were guarantined, 2 of my friends came to visit us but weren't allowed because of the severity and that they could be contaminated.....they made a deposit of \$800 to help with medical cost. I'm speechless with the outward help and concern towards my little girl, Cassie. Thank vou one and all! Debra Rasmussen
