

# 30 insane facts about dogs

## Dogs and humans

- 1 A dog's nose is like a human fingerprint, in that it can be used to identify them.
- 2 The maximum sentence in South Carolina, USA for beating your dog is longer than the sentence for beating your wife!
- 3 Dogs only have 1,700 tastebuds compared to humans who have 9,000.
- 4 Paul McCartney added in an extra high-pitched whistle in the song 'A Day in the Life' for his Shetland sheepdog.
- 5 Lord Byron was so outraged that Cambridge Trinity College wouldn't let him bring his dog so he brought a bear instead.



## History

- 12 Spiked dog collars originate from Ancient Greece where they were designed to protect their dog's throats from wolf attacks.
- 13 Dogs curl up when they're sleeping because of an old-age instinct, so that they can protect their vital organs when asleep.
- 14 The earliest fossils of dogs date back to 10,000 B.C.
- 15 All dog breeds are descended from a species called the Tormarctus, a hyena-like creature that lived over 15 million years ago.
- 16 The famous mythical guardian of the Underworld in Greek mythology was the three-headed dog Cerberus.



## Different breeds

- 21 There are two dogs who have black tongues: The Chow Chow and the Sharpei.
- 22 Greyhounds can run up to 45 miles per hour, making them the fastest dogs on the earth.
- 23 The Newfoundland dog breed was originally bred to help fishermen, and so have a water resistant coat and webbed feet.
- 24 The Norwegian Lundehund is the only dog breed to have six toes on each foot.
- 25 Bloodhounds have the ability to trace scents that are over 300 hours old.
- 26 The Basenji, an African wolf dog, is the only breed of dog that cannot bark.



## Characteristics

- 6 The only sweat glands that dogs have are between their paw pads.
- 7 A dog's sense of smell is more than 100,000 times stronger than a human's.
- 8 Dogs can see in the dark due to a special membrane in their eyes called the tapetum lucidum.
- 9 Dogs have wet noses because they lick their noses and absorb scent chemicals, so that they can smell better.
- 10 It has been proven that dogs can actually 'smell' some types of cancer.
- 11 Dogs release oxytocin (the love hormone) in their brains when they interact with dogs and humans.

## Statistics

- 17 It is estimated that in the US, 1 million dogs have been named as the primary beneficiaries of their owners' will.
- 18 The oldest dog to date lived to be 29 years and 5 months old.
- 19 In America, more than 1 in 3 families have a dog.
- 20 In 2002 more people were killed by dogs than sharks in the US.

## Cases of real-life dogs

- 27 With help from the ASPCA, some of Michael Vick's fighting dogs have now become certified therapy dogs.
- 28 There's a Border Collie called Chaser who can recognise 1,022 words.
- 29 The first big Hollywood dogs star was Rin Tin Tin, after he was rescued during the First World War.
- 30 Fido, Abraham Lincoln's dog, was also assassinated.

## Glenbard membership meeting August 10<sup>th</sup> 2022 at DuPage County Fairgrounds & Zoom

**Members in attendance:** Gerry Bara, Carol Dinelle, Bette McMillan, Sheila Gardner, Candy Ellis, Mary Therese Marosits, Sandi Stephenson, Pat Senne, Joan Mazat, and Carole Moen.

The meeting started with a **Zoom presentation** by Leslie Allison-Seei, guest of Gail Meyers.

Leslie spoke about the **Largest Dog Wedding** October 2<sup>nd</sup> 2022 at the Kane County Cougars baseball field located in Geneva IL. They will be trying to break the Guinness World Record of the number of dogs getting married at the same time.

The incentive to have your dog get married for the fee of \$25 per dog is half of the money will be donated to K9's for Warriors. This group rescues shelter dogs and trains them to be service dogs for veterans with PTSD. The cost for the training is around \$25,000 per dog.

The event starts at 8 AM where the dogs will check in and be matched up with a partner if they do not already have one. All the dogs will be married at the same time which will take place at noon.

The event ends at 2 PM.

There will be activities, booths and rescue groups at the event. The other half of the proceeds will be split among the rescue groups attending the event.

Besides enlisting dog wedding participants, Leslie was also looking for stewards with dog training experience to help with the morning procedures. The dogs will be checked in and then divided up into groups of 25 couples. They want one steward per group.

Leslie also offered if Glenbard would like to participate we could be given a time slot for a demonstration.

Carole asked Leslie having attended the event last summer in Villa Park, if the dogs getting married were not allowed to be on prong collars. Leslie said that rule would be in effect. Joan had a short discussion about the positive use of prong collars. Leslie stood firm, no ticky (prong), no washy (wedding).

There was some discussion regarding the event after the presentation.

Carole was running late and did not have a printed copy of the minutes. Since they were published in Barks a week ago, Sheila G made the motion at Laura P suggestion to accept the minutes as published in Barks. Pat S seconded the motion. Carole also stated that Sandi had offered to help with the C & B rewrite that had been left off the minutes. Sandi was on zoom, and Carole did not hear her.


**Presidents Report:** Joan said the classes are going good and thanked the instructors.

We are short a Rally instructor on Tuesday night since Lori has taken a leave of absence for personal reasons. Someone suggested asking Carol S. Another possible might be Deb and Mary, the sisters that taught Rally for us before Covid. Someone said they are at Lyons on Tuesday.



Gail reminded us that she would not be present this coming Monday. Pat S said she could help out.

Joan reiterated that we need substitute instructors.

**Matches:** Sept 6th, Oct 4th and Nov 1<sup>st</sup>. Candy said she could steward for the matches and the trial in addition to doing the banquet for 2023 and the awards.

Joan asked for a nominating committee. Candy, Sandi and Carole volunteered.

Carole brought up the board members' terms. She suggested the 5 should alternate two-year terms to be less confusing. Sheila said the terms are 1 year, 2 years and 3 years so they come due at different times. Carole mentioned that she doesn't think the current board knows how many years anyone has.

Joan discussed the club status and a rumor that had been circulating about the club closing next year. She said that was definitely false. She told the membership the shortage of instructors had been discussed at the board meeting and what would happen if one of them had an accident or family crisis. Who would replace them? Joan added that we do not have a shortage of students.

It had been suggested at the board meeting that maybe we might need to cut some of the classes back to only one each. That might be how the rumor started.

**Vice President's Report:** Karen said Nancy is moving back from South Carolina to Naperville and would be interested in rejoining the club.

Francis would also rejoin. Pat S has his paperwork. Carole made a motion to reinstate Francis as a member. Motion passed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Shawn said we lost some money on the Agility trial which is unusual. Bette said the entries were low.

**Obedience & Rally trials:** November 4<sup>th</sup> through the 6<sup>th</sup>, Friday – Sunday. Two Rally trials on Friday. Saturday and Sunday one Obedience and one Rally each day.

Pat S said the premium is almost done. We will need stewards.

Joan said we will get the information out early to hopefully have better entries than last year.

Joan went over some of last year's expenses with the building rental being the largest.

Having a raffle was discussed. If someone would like to do it that would be good. Anyone donating something would have to be raffle ready. As in a basket it has to be assembled. The question was brought up will we be closed the Monday after the trial. Pat said she would check the class schedule to see if that could be done.

**Agility:** October 15<sup>th</sup> and 16<sup>th</sup> at the Farm. Judge is Kathy Rudolph. Bette said Bob has the premium up. Several people have already signed up. You can also sign up to steward. The entries should be good.

# AUTUMN SAFETY GUIDE

## 1 Be aware of rodenticides

As temperatures drop, rodents seek shelter around homes. This leads to an increase in poisons put out for pests. Often fatal to pets, keep watch for them outside & keep them out of reach in the home!



## 2 Use caution with leaf piles

Leaf piles are super fun to jump in or run through, but they can hide hazards underneath. Watch out for glass, wildlife, trash & other dangers in those piles.



## 3 Keep school supplies away

## 4 Secure pets around guests

Holiday visits mean doors opening frequently, which means opportunities for door-darting! Pets should be kept secure to avoid escape. Many pets are wary of new people, so let them have space & avoid forcing interaction.



## 5 Be careful with holiday treats

Keep those delicious holiday foods out of reach of pets & avoid feeding table scraps. Cooked bones, chocolate, bread dough & many other foods can be very dangerous or even fatal for pets!



## 6 Be careful with decorations

Holiday decorations can look like fun toys for pets. Many can be sharp if chewed, tangle around intestines or contain toxic substances. Keep decorations out of reach of pets.



## 7 Be aware of antifreeze

Many people begin to winterize their cars in autumn. Antifreeze can contain ethylene glycol, which gives it a sweet taste that's appealing to many animals. Watch for spills or open containers of antifreeze!



## 8 Keep up with preventatives

Heartworm, fleas & ticks. These pests don't just go away when the leaves begin to fall. Keep using preventatives to protect pets through autumn & check pets for ticks & fleas often.



## 9 Watch out for mushrooms & wild animals


Mushrooms tend to sprout in autumn & some can make animals very sick. Wild animals are also out, preparing to hibernate, so watch for snakes & other critters.

At the August 2022 meeting, the Board voted to make the following COVID provisions permanent:

### **Qualifying Scores for Obedience & Rally Titles:**

- **In all Obedience and Rally classes that require three qualifying scores to earn a title, the three scores may be earned under the same judge.**

### **Assignment Limitations:**

- There are no mileage restrictions for judging Obedience or Rally trials.
- There are no restrictions on the number of times an individual can judge a class at Obedience or Rally trials in a cluster.

## THE SCARY TRUTH ABOUT FIRES

**40,000** pets die each year in house fires

**1,000** fires are started by pets each year

## MAKE AN EMERGENCY KIT

**Assemble a portable emergency kit with enough supplies to last 7 days.**

**It should include:**

- Medications and medical records
- Leashes, harnesses or carriers for safe transport
- Current photos in case they are lost
- Bowls, cat litter and pan, can opener
- Plastic bags and paper towels to clean up waste
- Toys and pet beds
- Emergency contact numbers
- Food and bottled water

## TIPS FOR PREVENTING HOUSE FIRES

**Remove or lock the knobs on your stove**  
your pet may nudge the stove knobs just enough to ignite a burner. Knob covers are an inexpensive and effective way to prevent this from happening.

**Do not leave candles unattended**  
extinguish all open flames when you leave a room so they aren't tipped over with a paw or tail. Consider using flameless candles.

**Pet-Proof your home**  
go through your home as if you're baby-proofing and eliminate any loose wires or other potential hazards.

**Beware of water bowls on wooden decks**  
the hot rays of the sun, when filtered through a glass water bowl can actually ignite the wooden deck below. Use ceramic or stainless steel instead.

## BE PREPARED FOR AN EMERGENCY



### GET A RESCUE ALERT STICKER

These stickers, placed on a front-facing window, will alert rescue workers of the presence of pets inside your home.



### ARRANGE A SAFE HAVEN

Arrange a place for pets to stay if you evacuate. Do not leave your pets at home. If it isn't safe for you, it isn't safe for them!



### MAKE AN EMERGENCY KIT

Have your kit made and keep it in a safe location near your front door for easy access.



### KEEP IDENTIFICATION ON YOUR PET

Keep up-to-date license and contact info on your pet at all times. Consider having pets microchipped.

As many of you may have read, there is currently a “Parvo-like” outbreak in Michigan that is affecting dogs. **While the dogs initially tested negative for the parvovirus, it has been confirmed that parvovirus is the cause of the outbreak.** At this time, the cases have only been reported in Michigan. **If you are traveling to Michigan,** please ensure your dog is up to date on their vaccinations. Puppies or young dogs that have not had a complete vaccination series are at highest risk. If you do travel it is recommended to avoid dog parks, rest areas, or any area where a high number of dogs might have been to. The typical signs of Parvo virus include, but not limited to: vomiting, diarrhea, not wanting to eat, and lethargy. Please contact your clinic if your dog shows any of these signs.


